Competitive Criteria Process for the 2022 Sales and Use Tax Exclusion Program Applications

Tuesday, June 21, 2022

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SUMMARY

By the January 7, 2022, application deadline for the first Sales and Use Tax Exclusion (STE) Program application period for the 2022 calendar year, CAEATFA received 52 applications requesting over \$300 million in STE. Pursuant to the competitive process and pools of STE established in program regulations, CAEATFA staff ("Staff") was prepared to bring 24 applications before the Board for consideration at this meeting, however, one applicant withdrew its application at the last minute. Therefore, Staff is bringing 23 applications before the Board for consideration at this meeting. If the Board approves all applications up for consideration, approximately \$4,167,183 in STE will remain in the general pool of STE, and applications on the wait list will be reviewed and presented to the Board for approval in the order in which they are ranked based on competitive criteria.

Below is further background on the relevant regulatory provisions and details on the process Staff took in determining the competitive criteria scores and rankings.

Tables 1–3 below provide a breakdown of the allocation of each pool of STE.

BACKGROUND AND REGULATIONS

Per-Applicant Cap, Pools of STE, and Order of Consideration

Statute currently limits CAEATFA to awarding \$100 million in STE each calendar year. Program regulations require that applications are capped at \$10 million in STE per applicant, per calendar year; that \$20 million in STE is available to award only to applications requesting \$2 million or less in STE through September each year ("Small Project Pool"); and that for applicants wishing to exceed the \$10 million per-applicant STE cap, \$15 million in STE is available to award in addition to the \$10 million STE cap in the first application period of the calendar year.

The order in which applications are reviewed and considered by CAEATFA is based on a ranking of Competitive Criteria,⁵ except that applications being considered under the Small Project Pool must be heard before applications being considered for an award under the general pool of STE.⁶

If the amount requested in the last application considered in the Small Project Pool exceeds the STE available from the pool, CAEATFA shall award the remaining STE request using STE from the general pool of STE allocation, if any remains. Any applicant requesting \$2 million or less in STE that is not awarded from the Small Project Pool is considered for an award from the general pool of STE allocation. If the amount requested in the last application requesting STE from the \$15 million in STE set-aside for larger projects exceeds the STE available from the set-aside, the applicant shall only receive the amount remaining from the \$15 million in STE set-aside. If the amount requested in the last application considered exceeds the STE available in the calendar year, the Authority shall award the remaining STE request using STE from the following calendar year, up to \$2 million in STE. Any remaining applications are placed on the waiting list.

Competitive Criteria

The applications with the greatest point score are reviewed and presented to the CAEATFA Board. In the event of a tie, the application representing the smaller STE award is considered first.¹⁰

<u>Environmental Benefits (100 Points)</u>. Applicants with Recycled Resource Extraction Projects or Projects that produce an Advanced Transportation Technology or an Alternative Source product, component, or system (i.e., a Project that has environmental benefits that can be monetized and scored pursuant to the Program's regulations) ¹¹ receive 100 points.

<u>Unemployment (Up to 50 Points)</u>. Applicants can receive up to 50 points based on how much greater the local unemployment rate is in comparison to the annual average statewide unemployed

rate pursuant to the following formula: Points = ((local rate/state rate) * 100) - 100. For example, if the annual average statewide unemployment rate is 5.23%, and the local unemployment rate for the project is 7.5%, the project would earn 43 points as follows: ((7.5%/5.23%) * 100) - 100 = 43 points.¹²

<u>Job Creation (up to 75 Points)</u>. Applicants can also receive up to 75 points based on the amount of the sales tax exclusion per job created as a result of the estimated marginal increase in equipment purchased from the STE.

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Points for Job Creation

1 Job \leq $50,000 in STE = 75 points

$50,000 in STE < 1 Job \leq $100,000 in STE = 60 points

$100,000 in STE < 1 Job \leq $150,000 in STE = 55 points

$150,000 in STE < 1 Job \leq $200,000 in STE = 45 points

$200,000 in STE < 1 Job \leq $300,000 in STE = 40 points

$300,000 in STE < 1 Job \leq $400,000 in STE = 35 points

$400,000 in STE < 1 Job \leq $750,000 in STE = 30 points

$750,000 in STE < 1 Job \leq $1,500,000 in STE = 20 points

1 Job > $1,500,000 in STE, or 0 jobs created = 0 points
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For example, if an application requests \$7,000,000 in STE and the project is anticipated to create 10 jobs as a result of the STE, 1 job created is worth \$700,000 in STE, and, therefore, 30 points would be awarded.¹³

<u>Natural Disaster Relief (50 Points)</u>. An applicant will receive 50 points if it can demonstrate the project is to relocate or rebuild the applicant's facility due to a fire, flood, storm, or earthquake identified in a state of emergency proclaimed by the Governor within two years of the time of application.¹⁴

<u>California Headquarters (15 Points)</u>. Applicants with corporate headquarters located in California receive 15 points.¹⁵

<u>Eligibility for Statewide Partial Exemption for Manufacturing and Research & Development (50 Points)</u>. Applicants that are not eligible to use any of the exemptions established pursuant to Section 6377.1 of the Revenue and Taxation Code (administered through the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration) receive 50 points.¹⁶

<u>Emerging Strategic Industry (75 Points)</u>. An applicant with a project in an Emerging Strategic Industry receives 75 points.

2022 APPLICATION WAITLIST

The applications listed in Table 7 are currently on the waitlist for consideration in calendar year 2022. Because an applicant that was to be considered for an STE award from the general pool recently withdrew its application for consideration, if the Board approves all applications up for consideration, approximately \$4,167,183 in STE will remain in the general pool of STE. Program regulations provide that applications on the wait list will be reviewed and presented to the Board for approval in the order in which they are ranked based on competitive criteria. Staff anticipates bringing West Coast Waste Co., Inc. to the Board for consideration at the July or August 2022 Board meeting.

To the extent that additional STE becomes available during the 2022 calendar year, applications on the waitlist will be reviewed and presented to the CAEATFA Board for approval in the order in which they are ranked based on competitive criteria. The waitlist expires at the end of the calendar year, and if an applicant on the waitlist wishes to be considered for a 2023 STE allocation, it must submit a new application when CAEATFA begins accepting applications for 2023.

Eligibility and application information, including Qualified Property amounts, have not yet been verified by staff.

ONGOING AND UPCOMING PROGRAM ACTIVITIES

The Governor's 2022 May revised budget proposal would allocate to the STE Program an additional \$15 million in STE per calendar year for the next three years that would be made available only to projects that manufacture, refine, process, or recover lithium. Additionally, AB 2887 (Eduardo Garcia) would increase the STE Program's cap to \$150 million in STE each calendar year.
