Over 600 State and local agencies raised close to \$32.9 billion in 1985 by selling 1,485 public debt instruments. As a group, cities were the most active issuers--going to market with 461 issuances totalling more than \$6.6 billion.

The focus of this report is on issuing agencies. As such, the report summarizes the number of issues completed and the dollar amounts sold within two categories of statewide issuers and eighteen categories of local issuers. The data presented update information published in two previous volumes of the Commission's *1985 Annual Report*, which focus on types of debt instruments and the purposes for which these debt instruments were sold.

This third volume of the *1985 Annual Report* summarizes information provided by State and local agencies pursuant to Chapter 1088, Statutes of 1981, as of August 15, 1986. The reported data are not subject to audit by the California Debt Advisory Commission.

**ANNUAL REPORT 1985  
CALIFORNIA PUBLIC DEBT BY ISSUING AGENCIES**

**I. Introduction**

State agencies, cities, counties, school districts, redevelopment agencies, and other special districts are authorized to issue debt to finance certain programs or projects. These debt issuances are reported to the California Debt Advisory Commission under the provisions of Section 8855 of the California Government Code.

This report focuses on the types of public agencies and instrumentalities which issued debt in 1985. As such, the report summarizes the number of issues completed and the dollar amounts sold within two categories of statewide issuers and eighteen categories of local issuers.

Being third in a series, this report updates the data previously published in the *Annual Report 1985: Summary of California Public Debt* and the *Annual Report 1985: Calendar of Issues* by including debt issuances sold in 1985 that were reported to the Commission after March 31, 1986. Detailed information on the purposes of debt financings and types of debt instruments completed in 1985 may be found in these two previous reports.

The information presented in this summary report was drawn from reports filed by issuers pursuant to the California Government Code, Section 8855. The data are not audited by the Commission.

**II. Overview of California State and Local Debt**

Six hundred twenty-four public agencies raised almost \$32.9 billion through 1,485 debt issuances in 1985. As shown in Table 1, State Agencies (12 issuers, divided into seven categories) together with the California Higher Education Loan Authority and the California Student Loan Finance Corporation completed 127 debt issues totalling almost \$8.6 billion in 1985. Although the two issuers of student loan bonds are not agencies of the State government, these corporations are included in the *State* portion of this report because they provide funds on a Statewide basis.

As a group, five California Finance Agencies and Authorities account for the largest percentage of the debt sold on the statewide level with 86 issues totalling close to \$3.8 billion.



The largest single issuer by volume was the State of California which issued close to \$3.3 billion (21 issues) through the State Treasurer's Office. This contrasts with the California Department of Transportation which completed just one issue in the amount of \$5 million.

Table 2 presents an overview of 1985 debt issuances by 610 local issuing agencies (divided into 18 categories). Together, these instrumentalities of local governments completed 1,358 debt issues in 1985 which total about \$24.3 billion. (Note: Issuances of debt by public nonprofit benefit corporations--especially associated with the sale of certificates of participation--have been generally grouped within the issuer category of the public agencies or instrumentalities which have use of the proceeds.)

Cities, which comprise the largest group of agencies (165 issuers), issued the greatest volume of debt among all issuer categories (over \$6.6 billion) and also went to market more often than any other issuer group (461 issues). Parking Authorities, consisting of three issuers which reported one debt issuance each for a total of about \$27.6 million, comprised the smallest category of local issuing agencies for the year. The smallest aggregate amount of local public debt, close to \$13.8 million, was sold by Sanitation Districts, a group of six issuers which sold nine issues in 1985.

The debt issuances reported in this summary were undertaken to raise new funds as well as to refund or to advance refund outstanding indebtedness. Of the 145 refunding issues (about \$6.6 billion) sold by State and local agencies in 1985, 52 issues (over \$3.7 billion) were completely dedicated to refunding. The remaining 93 issues (close to \$2.9 billion) were for financings for which data are not available to determine whether partial or full refundings were accomplished.

Of the 145 refunding issues, 16 issues (over \$735 million) were sold by State agencies, and one issue (\$80 million) by the California Student Loan Finance Corporation. The remaining 128 issues (totalling about \$5.8 billion), were completed by local agencies, authorities, and other instrumentalities.

### III. Debt Financing by Issuer Group

Debt issuance by 624 state and local agencies (in 20 issuer groups) is presented in Tables 3 through 22. Each table summarizes debt issuances within an issuer category and lists the issuers assigned to that group in alphabetical order (within counties, where appropriate). Ranks were assigned to show the relative position of each issuer to all others within its group. A rank of #1 was assigned to the issuer within that category with the greatest amount of debt sold in 1985. Like amounts of debt sold were given the same rank so that the highest rank number is not necessarily indicative of the number of issuing agencies in any particular group.

### ***State Agencies***

In 1985, 12 State agencies completed 120 debt issuances totalling over \$7.8 billion, or 23.81 percent of California's total volume for the year. First ranking among these agencies is the Office of the State Treasurer, which sold close to \$3.3 billion (21 issues) for the State of California. The most frequent State issuer for the year 1985 is the California Health Facilities Financing Authority, having completed 39 debt issuances for a total of close to \$1.6 billion (Rank 2). The least amount of new State debt was sold by the California Department of Transportation which completed a single issuance of \$5 million (Rank 12). Table 3 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by State agencies.

### ***Student Loan Corporations***

Together, two nonprofit public benefit student loan corporations sold seven issues totalling \$760 million in 1985. This accounts for 2.31 percent of California's total volume for the year. The California Student Loan Finance Corporation completed five deals equalling \$560 million (Rank 1). The remainder, \$200 million (Rank 2), was sold in two issuances by the California Higher Education Loan Authority. Table 4 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by student loan corporations.

### ***Counties***

Of the 58 California counties, 37 completed new debt issuances totalling about \$4.7 billion (163 issues) in 1985. The amount sold is equivalent to 14.31 percent of California's total volume for the year. Excluded from these totals are 5 issues totalling more than \$91 million, which were sold by the City and County of San Francisco. These San Francisco issues have been grouped with the issuances of California cities in Table 6.

The county with the largest amount of new debt sold in 1985, over \$1.4 billion (9 issues), is Los Angeles (Rank 1). The county with the highest frequency of new debt issuances is the County of Orange with 27 issues totalling nearly \$1 billion (Rank 2). The smallest amount, \$1.5 million (Rank 37), was sold in a single issue by Trinity County. Table 5 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by counties.

### ***Cities***

In 1985, 165 entities, including the California Cities Financing Corporation acting on behalf of certain cities and multiple-city issuers, engaged in the issuance of public debt. As a group, these city issuers completed 461 debt issuances, totalling over \$6.6 billion (20.16 percent of California's total volume for the year).

The City of Los Angeles issued the largest amount of new debt, over \$1.2 billion (Rank 1). With 18 issuances each, Los Angeles, Riverside, and Fresno were the most frequent issuers among cities. The next largest volume, over \$305 million (Rank 2) was sold by the City of San Diego in 12 issuances.

In 1985, there were 11 additional cities which sold over \$100 million each. In order of volume sold (starting with the largest amount), these are: Riverside (Riverside County), Loma Linda (San Bernardino County), Irvine (Orange County), Fremont (Alameda County), San Jose (Santa Clara County), Oakland (Alameda County), Fresno (Fresno County), Santa Clara (Santa Clara County), Stockton (San Joaquin County), San Bernardino (San Bernardino County), and Long Beach (Los Angeles County).

The smallest amount for the year, \$40 thousand (Rank 162), was sold by the City of Los Altos (Santa Clara County) as a single issue. Table 6 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by cities.

### *Community Colleges*

In 1985, 11 community college districts completed 13 new debt issuances for a total amount of more than \$69.7 million. This amount equates to 0.21 percent of California's total volume for the year.

The largest portion of this group's total, \$26.7 million (Rank 1), was sold by the Los Angeles Community College District in a single issue. The smallest amount for this group, \$1.1 million (Rank 11), was sold as a single issue by the Monterey Peninsula Community College District. None of the 11 districts completed more than two issuances in 1985. Table 7 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by community colleges.

### *Community Facilities Districts*

As reported to the CDAC, six Community Facilities Districts sold almost \$65.5 million (8 issues) in 1985, which equates to 0.20 percent of California's total volume for the year. The largest issuer within this group is the Southern Poway Community Facilities District #1 (San Diego County), which sold a single issue in the amount of \$30 million (Rank 1).

The smallest amount, \$120 thousand (Rank 6), was sold as a single issue by the Portola Community Facilities District #1 (Plumas County). The most frequent issuer, with the completion of three debt issuances, was the County of Riverside Community Facilities District.

(Note: Two community facilities district issuances--totalling \$26 million--are included in Table 6 because of the way in which they were reported to this Commission.) Table 8 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by community facilities districts.

### *Community Services Districts*

One debt issuance each was completed by five community services districts in 1985 for a total of more than \$25.8 million. This amount represents 0.08 percent of California's total volume for the year. The Lake Arrowhead Community Services District (San Bernardino County) sold the largest amount, over \$21 million (Rank 1) within this group, while the smallest amount, \$365 thousand (Rank 5), was sold by the Kettleman City Community Services District (Kings County). Table 9 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by community services districts.

### *Hospital Districts*

Nearly \$321.8 million (9 issues) was sold by seven hospital districts and one hospital financing authority in 1985. This aggregate amount equates to 0.98 percent of California's total volume for the year. The largest amount, close to \$110 million (Rank 1), was sold by the Palomar Pomerado Hospital District (San Diego County), followed by \$75 million (Rank 2), which was sold by the County of Santa Clara-El Camino Hospital District.

The Lompoc Hospital District (Santa Barbara County) sold the smallest amount, close to \$6.8 million (Rank 8). Except for the Eden Township Hospital District (Alameda County) which sold two issues, just a single issuance was completed by each issuer of this group. Table 10 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by hospital districts.

### *Housing Authorities*

This group of issuers includes housing authorities and other local governmental agencies which sold public debt issues in 1985 for the primary purpose of financing housing. Together, these 52 issuers sold over \$1.9 billion, or 5.80 percent of California's total volume for the year. The various amounts sold by these agencies range from over \$223 million (Rank 1) for the San Diego Housing Agency (9 issues) to nearly \$1.1 million (Rank 52) for the County of San Mateo Housing Agency (1 issue).

Besides the San Diego Housing Agency, six additional agencies completed new public debt issuances in amounts of over \$100 million (in order of volume, commencing with the largest amount): the County of Sacramento Housing Agency, the County of San Bernardino Housing Agency, the County of Los Angeles Housing Agency, the County of Riverside Housing Agency, the County of Orange Housing Agency, and the County of Santa Clara Housing Agency.

The most frequent issuer of this issuer category was the County of Sacramento Housing Agency which went to market 13 times in 1985. Table 11 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by housing authorities.

### *Industrial Development Agencies*

In 1985, 34 industrial development agencies sold over \$228 million (69 issues) of new public debt. This amount represents 0.69 percent of California's total volume for the year. The largest amount was sold in 14 issuances by the County of Los Angeles Industrial Development Agency, close to \$28.7 million (Rank 1). This agency was also the most frequent issuer of this group. The smallest amount was sold in a single issuance by the Covina Industrial Development Agency (Los Angeles County), \$425 thousand (Rank 27). Five industrial development agencies issued \$5 million (Rank 15) in 1985. Table 12 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by industrial development agencies.

### *Parking Authorities*

The three parking authorities which reported one debt issuance each for 1985 sold a total volume of about \$27.6 million. This equates to 0.08 percent of California's total volume for the year. The Pasadena Parking Authority and the Alhambra Parking Authority (both in Los Angeles County) sold \$16 million (Rank 1) and just over \$7.1 million (Rank 2), respectively. The San Jose Parking Authority (Santa Clara County) sold \$4.5 million (Rank 3). Table 13 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by parking authorities.

### *Port and Harbor Authorities*

This group of four issuers sold about \$80 million of public debt in 1985. The port and harbor authorities' volume represents 0.24 percent of California's total volume for the year. Single issuances were completed in the following amounts: \$35 million (Rank 1) by the Los Angeles Harbor Department, \$25 million (Rank 2) by the Los Angeles Harbor Improvement Corporation, \$18 million (Rank 3) by the Oxnard Harbor District (Ventura County), and over \$2 million (Rank 4) by the Port of Redwood City (San Mateo County). Table 14 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by port and harbor authorities.

### *Power Authorities and Agencies*

This group is comprised of 10 issuers who are substantially engaged in electric power generation and its distribution. Together, these issuers sold 21 issues totalling almost \$3.9 billion in 1985. This volume equates to 11.82 percent of California's total volume for the year. Issues sold by utilities districts are grouped separately and are not included in these totals (see Table 20).

The amounts of public debt sold by these authorities and agencies range from over \$1.6 billion (Rank 1) sold in seven issuances by the Northern California Power Agency--the most frequent issuer of this group--

to \$4.9 million (Rank 10) sold in a single issuance by the County of Monterey Power Authority. Table 15 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by power authorities and agencies.

### ***Redevelopment Agencies***

Included in this group are community redevelopment agencies and other local governmental entities which have sold public debt issues for redevelopment purposes in 1985. These 111 agencies completed 238 issuances totalling over \$3.7 billion or 11.26 percent of California's total volume for the year. The largest portion of debt in this category, close to \$438 million (Rank 1), was sold by the Los Angeles Community Redevelopment Agency in 15 issuances--the greatest frequency of issuance.

An additional six issuers sold new public debt in excess of \$100 million, as follows (listed by volume, beginning with the largest amount): the City and County of San Francisco, the Oakland Redevelopment Agency (Alameda County), the Santa Ana Community Redevelopment Agency (Orange County), the Santa Clara Redevelopment Agency (Santa Clara County), the West Covina Redevelopment Agency (Los Angeles County), and the Lancaster Redevelopment Agency (Los Angeles County).

The smallest amount, \$600 thousand (Rank 103) was sold in a single issuance by the Port Hueneme Redevelopment Agency (Ventura County). Table 16 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by redevelopment agencies.

### ***Sanitation Districts***

A total amount of about \$13.8 million (9 issues) of new public debt was sold by six sanitation districts in 1985. This accounts for 0.04 percent of California's total volume for the year. Except for the Lake County Sanitation District, which completed four issuances totalling close to 6.3 million (Rank 1), just one issue was sold by each of the remaining five sanitation districts. The smallest amount, \$101 thousand (Rank 6) was sold by the Tehama County Sanitation District. Table 17 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by sanitation districts.

### ***School Districts***

In 1985, 104 school districts, boards of education, and related issuers completed 121 new public debt issuances totalling over \$726 million, or 2.21 percent of California's total volume for the year. Most of these entities sold just one issue. The most frequent issuer with three issues for a total of \$56.3 million (Rank 2) was the Kern Unified High School District (Kern County).

The largest amount, \$115 million (Rank 1), was sold in a single issuance by the Los Angeles Unified School District (Los Angeles County). The smallest amount, \$250 thousand (Rank 83) was sold by the Exeter

Unified High School District (Tulare County), which also sold one issue. Table 18 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by school districts.

### *Transit Districts*

This group of nine issuers completed 24 issuances totalling over \$509.6 million in 1985, equivalent to 1.55 percent of California's total volume for the year. The San Francisco Bay Area Rapid Transit District (multiple counties) sold the largest portion of this transit-related public debt, \$211.8 million (Rank 1) in five issuances.

The Southern California Rapid Transit District (multiple counties) and the County of Santa Clara Transit District (with seven issues the most frequent issuer) also sold more than \$100 million in debt. The smallest amount, \$3 million (Rank 9), was sold in a single issuance by Omnitrans (San Bernardino County). Table 19 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by transit districts.

### *Utilities Districts*

Almost \$110.8 million of debt was sold by five utilities districts in 1985. This amount represents 0.34 percent of California's total volume for the year. Each of these districts sold a single issue. The largest portion of this debt, \$104 million (Rank 1), was sold by the City and County of San Francisco Public Utility District. The smallest amount, \$290 thousand (Rank 5), was sold by the Georgetown Divide Public Utility District (El Dorado County). Table 20 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by utilities districts.

### *Water Districts*

In 1985, 35 water districts and related authorities completed 51 issuances totalling close to \$946.5 million, or 2.88 percent of California's total volume for the year. The amounts sold by individual water districts range from over \$158.5 million (Rank 1), sold in three issuances by the Irvine Ranch Water District (Orange County), to \$93 thousand (Rank 35), sold as a single issue by the Sunnyslope County Water District (San Benito County).

In addition, the following four entities also sold new public debt of at least \$100 million each: the Modesto Irrigation District (Stanislaus County), the South Fork of the American River Management Authority (SOFAR) located in El Dorado County, the County of San Diego Water Authority, and the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (Los Angeles County). The most frequent issuer was the Rancho California Water District (Riverside County) with five issues totalling over \$52.3 million (Rank 7). Table 21 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by water districts.

### *Miscellaneous Issuers*

This group is comprised of 10 public debt issues by five entities, which sold a combined total of close to \$337.9 million in 1985. This amount is equivalent to 1.03 percent of California's total volume for the year.

The largest amount, close to \$210.8 million (Rank 1) was sold in six issuances by the Regional Airports Improvement Corporation (Los Angeles County). The remaining four issuers sold one issue each in the following amounts: \$90.4 million (Rank 2), Irvine Public Facilities and Infrastructure Authority (Orange County); over \$25.6 million (Rank 3), County of San Diego Capital Asset Leasing Corporation; about \$7 million (Rank 4), Solano Financing Corporation (Solano County); and \$4 million (Rank 5), Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District (multiple counties). Table 22 summarizes 1985 debt issuances by miscellaneous issuers.

The types of debt instruments sold and the purposes for which public debt was issued in 1985 by the entities of this miscellaneous category, as well as the issuers of the other issuer categories, are contained in the *Annual Report 1985: Summary of California Public Debt* and the *Annual Report 1985: Calendar of Issues*.

## GLOSSARY

**COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION.** A governmental entity created under the California Health and Safety Code, Sections 34100 - 34160. By establishing a Community Development Commission, a community has the option of operating its redevelopment agency, or its housing authority together with its redevelopment agency, under a single governing board.

**COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT.** A governmental entity established under the Mello Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 (Sections 53311 - 53365.5 of the California Government Code) for the purpose of providing authorized facilities and services and levying special taxes and/or charges pursuant to the Act.

**COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT.** A governmental entity established for the purpose of providing community services in accord with the California Government Code, Sections 61600.5 - 61792.4.

**HOUSING AUTHORITY.** A local governmental entity established for the purpose of assisting with the financing of housing for low-income people, pursuant to the Community Redevelopment Law, commencing with Section 34200 of the California Health and Safety Code.

**HOUSING FINANCE AGENCY.** The California Housing Finance Agency is an agency of the State government, pursuant to the California Health and Safety Code, Section 50900, *et seq.* Local housing finance agencies are established in accord with Section 52000, *et seq.*, of the California Health and Safety Code.

**JOINT POWERS AGENCY.** An entity comprised of two or more public agencies pursuant to the California Government Code, Section 6500, *et seq.*

**NONPROFIT PUBLIC-BENEFIT CORPORATION.** These entities are created under the California Corporations Code. Pursuant to Section 5140 of the Corporations Code, nonprofit public-benefit corporations are authorized to sell debt instruments for any public or charitable purpose.

**REDEVELOPMENT AGENCY.** An agency created pursuant to the Community Redevelopment Law of the California Health and Safety Code, commencing with Section 34200.
